#### Setting up a MyNYSTRS Account

By setting up a NYSTRS (New York State Teachers Retirement System) account, you can update your name and address, change your beneficiaries, and submit prior service claims all from the comfort of your home. Before you start, make sure you have your seven-digit NYSTRS employee identification number (not your school district ID), your date of birth, a personal email account, and a cell phone number. #### Helpful Phone Numbers

- 211—Connects you to the most comprehensive listing of health and human services resources in Madison, Oneida and Herkimer counties.
- 511—Provides up-to-the-minute information about a variety of transportation-related matters, including traffic conditions, work zones, and construction reports, weather conditions and forecasts and transit services.
- 711—Permits persons with a hearing or speech disability to use the telephone system via a text telephone (TTY) or other device to call persons with or without such disabilities.
- 811—Call this number a few business days before you begin any digging, including common projects like planting trees and shrubs, or installing fences and mailboxes. Allow utility companies to respond to your request before breaking ground.
- **911**—Call to report police, fire or medical emergencies.
- 988—Puts you in touch instantly with a counselor who's trained to help in an emergency such as having thoughts of suicide, substance abuse crisis or emotional distress. Calls are free and confidential.

Medigaps are health insurance policies that offer standardized benefits to work with Original Medicare (not with Medicare Advantage). They are sold by private insurance companies. If you have a Medigap, it pays part or all of certain remaining costs after Original Medicare pays first. Medigaps may cover outstanding deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments. Medigaps may also cover health care costs that Medicare does not cover at all, like care received when travelling abroad. Remember, Medigaps only work with Original Medicare. If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, you cannot buy a Medigap. Before you buy a Medigap policy, be sure to do your research.
